

## Welcome to the ScotRail in the Community Virtual Awards!

#### **Portlethen Station**

Portlethen Social Gardening Group, supported by Mearns and Coastal Living Network

The Portlethen social gardening group for older people adopted Portlethen train station 4 years ago and over that time have transformed the unkempt garden grounds into a beautifully vibrant and creative area. Working with the Men's Shed, they have installed planters which provide a seasonal display of plants that provide beauty and biodiversity. The station area has also become part of the town's "edible trail" project, and is a focal point for flowers, fruit bushes and herbs.

The group, supported by the Mearns and Coastal Healthy Living Network, values the social aspect of working together to benefit the community whilst sharing knowledge, skills and gardening creativity as they work together.

John Shackleton, a Portlethen Social Gardening Group member said

"I have been a member of the group for a number of years now. We alternate (coronavirus permitting), between cultivating the Primary School garden with the children and tending the gardens along the platforms at Portlethen Station. As I am retired and no longer meet people with my job, it gives me a chance to get out and do something useful in the community and meet other people who are similarly at a loose end, and keep the railway station looking bright, tidy and welcoming to passengers leaving or alighting, or even a pleasant glimpse of colour for longer distance travellers as they whiz past."

#### **Aberdour Station Gardens**

John Burrell, a local resident of Aberdour in Fife supported the nomination of Aberdour station for the improvements that were made to the steep terraces on platform 2 of the station in 2019. The group created new terraces and planting as well as continuing to provide a wonderful display of tubs and hanging baskets on both platforms throughout the summer and autumn. "It must be wonderful to have a station like this.


We couldn't agree more.



#### **Gorebridge Station**

Craig Walls and Cath McGill started volunteering at Gorebridge Station in Midlothian three years ago starting off in 2017 with around 18 wooden boxes built by the local Community Justice Team. In 2020 there are 35 containers which have all been sponsored, encouraging interest and pride in the station. Cath said

"We enjoy gardening and find it very therapeutic. Getting local people and businesses involved by paying for annual sponsorship of the planters has enabled us to be self-funded and the interest has grown every year. The community has benefited from us being able to create a colourful area which everyone can enjoy when travelling to or through Gorebridge on the train and it's something that the people who live in Gorebridge can be proud of."

**St. Denis Primary School**Station Adopters

A group of twelve very enthusiastic gardeners aged between seven and 10 years old, from St Denis Primary School, have been tending the planters at Duke Street Station, Glasgow for almost two years.

Rain or shine, they carry their plants and gardening tools from school over to the station to carry out their tasks. As well as planting bulbs, they grow plants from seed and transfer the seedlings from the school greenhouse to the station planters. There have been many benefits to their efforts; the station planters look beautiful and colourful; wildlife has been encouraged and the children themselves have grown in confidence as they develop their gardening and growing skills. The gardeners from St Denis are committed and enthusiastic, and always behave in a responsible manner at the station. They are very aware of rail safety and have shared its importance with others at school. When they are out wearing their ScotRail high-vis vests they beam with pride and they always show the head teacher photos of their gardening exploits when they return to school.

**Perth Station**Garden Volunteers

"Nurturing Nature" is the aim of the group of ScotRail colleagues who, when not working, have volunteered their time over the last seven years turning an area of wasteland into beautiful gardens.

Often joined by their families and volunteers from the wider community, they rejuvenated what was a disused, overgrown and neglected area of scrub land, turning it into a thriving biodiversity garden. There are now ponds, an orchard of native Scottish apple trees, a wildflower section, raised vegetable beds and an herbaceous border. There is also a bird feeding station beside the group's pride and joy – a summer house with a living roof – which is often used for meetings, biodiversity blitzes and fundraising activities. The group also aims to recycle and reuse at every opportunity in support of the aims of Zero Waste Perth.

**6VT Youth Community Rail Partnership** 

6VT Youth Community Rail Partnership is made up of young people from a variety of ages and backgrounds.

All of them got involved through the 6VT Youth Service and now they passionately share the Community Rail Partnership's work with anyone who will listen! Having delivered many projects in 2019, the Pram Safety project was a standout achievement which gained them the winner's title.

Working in partnership with ScotRail, a special training package focusing on making train travel easier and convenient for people travelling with prams and buggies was arranged. The accompanied train journey enabled the participants to put into practice the pram safety knowledge learned the previous week. The session involved a return journey to Dunbar from Edinburgh Waverley Station.

One participant, Adel said "I went on the Parent and Buggy safety trip. I had never taken my kids on the train, so I had never even considered all the safety stuff about travelling with little kids and prams. The safety video really helped to prepare me for the trip and showed me how I could get around. On the day of the trip we met with the Youth CRP & ScotRail staff who were helpful and nice. Then off we went for my kids' first train journey, which was fantastic! Because of this activity I actually had the confidence to go and do that trip again, but I took a friend and her kids and felt really proud I could keep her right on safety in the station."

Gardening Club/Station Adopters

To mark the dualling of the railway line from Aberdeen to Inverness, Dyce Gardening Club was keen to enhance the refurbished station with art.

Pupils from Dyce Academy Art Department were invited to produce Art Deco style posters advertising the area. The project formed a 13-week block in the curriculum for S3 art students and included researching the style before completing their designs. The 32 posters that resulted were professionally printed and displayed in frames on both platforms at Dyce Station. When the posters

were installed, press and local councillors were invited to join parents, pupils, club members, representatives from ScotRail and Lofthus Signs for a celebratory lunch in the platform shelter. It was the educational and intergenerational approach to the project which earned the highly commended title from the judges.

#### Laura works for the Moving On project which was set up by Kilmarnock Station **Heritage Trust.**

The project supports individuals dealing with social isolation including those affected by addiction, bereavement, loneliness, and mental health issues. Laura has been instrumental in securing funding to facilitate a programme of activity called Mind Matters which helps people in the community recover from adversity. Her passion to assist people who may be struggling is inspiring and her dedication has meant the realisation of a programme that has assisted hundreds of people

recover and integrate back into their community. Laura has also recently been accepted on a CBT counselling course which will enable her to not only practice counselling with individuals but will also enhance her ability to oversee the organisation's nine counsellors and offer them mentoring support. The need for such a project has always been evident and increasingly so in current circumstances.

Jordan was nominated in the category of Volunteer of the Year, however the judges believed that Jordan showed exemplary traits which set him apart for the Outstanding Contribution award.

He first began volunteering with the Knowe Garden Centre just over a year ago. As he has cerebral palsy which affects his mobility and fine motor skills, and learning difficulties, he had found it difficult to be taken seriously when looking for work. This, together with some other challenges that Jordan has faced in his life had left him very isolated and depressed. With support from a local youth organisation, he was referred to the garden centre where he now attends 5 days a week. He volunteers his time at the garden centre as well as at both adopted railway stations, Auchinleck and New Cumnock. Some duties have been adapted to suit

his abilities; however, he excels at remembering which tools are best for each job, often setting them up for the day ahead. He has become more sociable, his mental health has improved dramatically, and he has benefited from being among other young people his age, particularly enjoying the camaraderie and the banter in the small team. In fact, you could say that volunteering has seen him blossom! Kaye Hannah from the garden centre says "I am very proud of Jordan. He's here because he wants to be, and a loyal, hardworking volunteer is invaluable. I wish I had six of Jordan!"
